Silver Mettle Stephen Van O'Meara continues a diminishing art

IN THE ICONOGRAPHY of color and ancient mythologies, silver is said to be the mirror of the soul, and so it is with the silverwork of Stephen Van O'Meara, a master silversmith, goldsmith and sculptor.

Introduced to silversmithing at age 11 while at summer camp in Colorado, he subsequently undertook a series of apprenticeships with European and American masters in the arts of sculpture, gold and silversmithing. "With no apprentices and the elders gone, it is a dying art—I feel so blessed that I am able to carry the torch a little longer," says the craftsman.

For O'Meara, that torch illuminates a series of handmade, one-of-a-kind and limited-edition collections. Past work has included such objects as a \$9,500 set of solid sterling silver dominoes and a scaled-down replica of Bernini's The Ecstasy of St. Teresa made from solid 18karat gold, lapis lazuli and quartz crystal, which took five years to create and is priced at \$325,000.

Linking old and new are O'Meara's uncompromising standards. "Everything I am as an artist is motivated by one principle," says O'Meara. "Art is the mirror of the eternal." ANDREW MYERS
