

The crtist: Stephen Van O'Meara's passion for silver began while taking a class at a Colorado summer camp when he was 11 years old. Throughout his life he has worked alongside talented artisans, honing his craft and learning age-old techniques. From jewel-

ry to holloware, miniatures to sculpture, he has created them all out of silver. Ten years ago, his work transitioned from being a part-time passion to being his livelihood.

"I'm fortunate to have met artisans who are very open about their trade and methods," he remarks. Hand-raising silver was one of the last techniques that the artist learned, though it is one of the oldest. With overlapping hammer blows he slowly raises and bends a flat sheet of silver to create bowls, goblets, serving trays and more. "The metal speaks to me," he says. "It develops its own life."

The business: While newly finished pieces make the Scottsdale showroom sparkle, the artist's 3,000-square-foot studio is filled with machines dating back a century. Amy handles the retail end of Stephen's work, and gladly offers tips on caring for silver. "Just a bit of dish soap will clean a piece if you use it on a regular basis," she explains. Showroom finds: Tea services, hand-raised vessels, miniature reproductions, holiday ornaments, goblets, baby porridgers, jewelry, sculpture and more make the store feel almost museumlike. Most pieces are one-of-a-kind, and all are limited-editions and made by hand.

Unusuαl custom works: Rubber band ball, bowl of loose pistachios, hourglass, .44 magnum silver bullet. —CH
